COURSE LOAD REQUIREMENTS

Eighty-six (86) credit units are required for the degree of Doctor of Law (J.D.). The required program in the full-time division extends over 6 full-time semesters. The required program in the part-time division extends over 8 part-time semesters, or the equivalent. Students must complete their course of study for the J.D. degree no earlier than 24 months and no later than 84 months after commencing law study at the law school or at a law school from which the school has accepted transfer credit.

Full-time: No student in the full-time division may take fewer than 12 hours. ABA Standards limit full-time students at Loyola to a maximum of 17 credit hours per semester. A student in the full-time division must complete six semesters in which he or she enrolls in a minimum of 12 academic credits. Students in the full-time division may not advance the date of their graduation by taking classes during the summer session. Additional credits earned in one academic year or summer session will not permit a student in the full-time division to take fewer than the minimum credit hours (12) per semester thereafter.

Part-time: No student in the part-time division may take fewer than 8 hours, or more than 12 hours per semester. Additional credits earned in one academic year or summer session will not permit a student in the part-time division to take fewer than the minimum credit hours per semester thereafter.

A student in the part-time division can achieve the required time in residence in either of two ways:

- **Eight Semesters:** A student in the part-time division can meet the residency requirement upon the completion of eight semesters.
- **Seven Semesters and at Least Two Summer Sessions:** A student in the part-time division can meet the residency requirement upon the completion of seven part-time semesters and at least a total of 8 academic credits over two or more summer sessions. Students in the part-time division who wish to accelerate their graduation should consult with the Registrar to make sure that they will be able to meet all degree and tuition requirements under the accelerated program.

Transferring Divisions: If approved to do so by the Office of the Dean, a student in the part-time division may transfer to the full-time division under the following conditions:

- A student in the part-time division who seeks to transfer to the full-time division before the third semester and graduate in three years (six semesters) must complete a minimum of six hours of summer courses.
- A student in the part-time division who seeks to transfer to the full-time division before the fourth semester and graduate in three years (six semesters) must complete a minimum of eight hours of summer courses.
- A student in the part-time division who seeks to transfer to the full-time division before the fifth semester and graduate in three years (six semesters) must complete a minimum of twelve hours of summer courses over two summers.
- Full-time students who seek to transfer to the part-time division must meet with a member of the Dean's Office to discuss the conditions upon which a transfer will be approved.
- Students may not transfer divisions for the final semester.

Dean's Permission: In exceptional circumstances, a student may apply in writing to the Dean or his/her delegate for permission to take fewer than the required semester hours. In such a case, the flat-rate tuition requirement may not be waived.

Summer Limit - All students may register for a maximum of eight credit hours during a summer session.

SPRING 2010 REGISTRATION SCHEDULE

****NOTE:** J.D. students register by the number of hours **successfully earned** as of the end of the prior Spring. Procedures and scheduled times must be adhered to in all cases. Academic credit will not be given for courses in which students have not properly registered. If a student fails to drop a course he/she is not attending but registered for, the student will receive a "WF" which will be permanent on the record. It is the responsibility of each student to register properly for his or her courses and to confirm course selections through the LOCUS system. LOCUS registration instructions are available on the university's website.

REGISTRATION MATERIALS ON THE WEB

Students are urged to use the School of Law's registration website (www.luc.edu/law/academics/register.html) for registration materials, including course and exam schedules. **Students should check the website for updates to the course and exam schedules.** Updates, including class cancellation, will occur up to, and including, the first week of classes. (If you have any questions, please contact the School of Law Registrar's Office at (312) 915-7167).

WHAT'S A TYPICAL COURSE LOAD?

Typical schedule loads are as follows:

Upper-class full time students	12-16 hrs/semester
Upper-class part-time students	8-12 hrs/semester

UPPER LEVEL REQUIRED COURSES

The full statement of upper-level required courses is contained on-line at www.luc.edu/law/academics/guidelines.html. The list can also be found under the Registrar section of the website in the listing for the Spring 2010 registration packet. **Students who have switched divisions, in particular, are urged to consult the list.**

Professional Responsibility is a required course that may be taken in any semester after the first year.

Part-Time day and part-time evening students must take Constitutional Law in the Spring Semester of the second year.

OTE: All students must register for all courses, in the required semester and year. Failure to register for a required course will result in a grade of "WF" in those required courses that were not taken. All students must complete one PERSPECTIVE ELECTIVE and SKILLS course prior to graduation.

FIRST YEAR STUDENTS

First-year students must register by LOCUS for their spring semester courses.

All Full-Time 1L students must register for Constitutional Law, Contracts, Criminal Law and Legal Writing II in the same section (1 or 2 or 3) to which they are currently assigned. All Full-Time 1L students also must register for ONE of the electives available to first year students. These electives are designated Perspective Elective (PER ELEC). First year students may not register for any other classes.

Part-Time 1Ls must register for their new courses, Contracts, Criminal Law, and Legal Writing II in the same section (1 or 2 or 3 or evening) in which they are currently assigned. In addition, 1Ls must register for Legal Writing II (the second semester for the Legal Writing experience) in the same small section in which they are currently assigned. Part-time 1Ls may **NOT** register for Perspective Elective (PER ELEC) courses.

Bar Applications for First Year Students

Students planning to sit for the Illinois Bar Examination after graduation may complete the character and fitness application in their first year. Materials are on-line through the Illinois Board of Admissions to the Bar website at www.ibaby.org. First year applications are due no later than **March 1, 2010**. If students do not apply during their first year, they may apply during their final year of law school, however, the application fee is substantially higher.

J.D. EXTERNS

Information, applications, the syllabus and required extern forms are available at <http://www.luc.edu/law/academics/special/externships.html>. Students who seek a position as an extern should read this site carefully. Applications are due to Dean Faught in Room 1477 by **January 2, 2010**. The application will be evaluated by the members of the Faculty Clinic Committee. If it is approved, the Office of the Registrar will inform you by e-mail that you are approved to register for the externship through LOCUS.

AUDITING CLASSES

Students who want to take a course without receiving academic credit may audit the course, provided that the course is not filled by students who have registered for credit. Students who have registered for credit in a class that is filled may not convert their registration to an audit. A course that is audited does not count as hours attempted, therefore, it is not considered in determining a student's academic full-time or part-time status; however, tuition is charged as though the course is being taken for credit. Class attendance is required; if you do not attend class, a final grade of "W" will be recorded. Assignments, including examinations and term papers, are not required, but you have a right to participate in class discussions. All auditors must complete and submit an audit request form in the School of Law Registrar's Office, room 1430. A course will not be converted to "Audit" after the "Change of Registration" period has ended.

DUAL DEGREE PROGRAMS

The School of Law offers J.D. students the opportunity to engage in cross-disciplinary study in three areas. While the specific requirements of each dual degree program differ, each program offers students the opportunity to acquire two degrees in less time than it would take if pursued independently. Students who are enrolled in a dual degree program must contact the Law Registrar, Dora Jacks, prior to registering for courses in the law school. Additional information on the Dual Degree Programs, including information on tuition charges, is available on-line at www.luc.edu/law/.

COURSES REQUIRING PRIOR APPROVAL

Students who expect to be registered in the following courses must have their approval forms signed by the appropriate parties and returned to the Law School Registrar's Office, ***no later than November 6, 2009***. Submission of the signed approval form will automatically register the student into the course. Students who wish to drop the course after submission of the approval form are responsible for withdrawing from the course. CERTIFICATE PROGRAMS

General information on certificate programs is available on-line at www.luc.edu/law/academics/certificate.html.

The certificate will appear as an official comment on the J.D. transcript, and degree candidates and alumni are free to indicate their certificate status on their resumes and bios. Actual certificates will be given to students at the time that diplomas are distributed, usually 4-6 weeks after the May graduation ceremony. **Please note that certificate status will not be noted in the commencement program nor at the commencement ceremony.**

2. Obtain an official copy of your J.D. transcript by contacting the Loyola's **main** Office of Registration and Records, Lewis Towers, room 504 at (312) 915-7221 or logon to the web at Loyola's Homepage (www.luc.edu) under LOCUS.
3. Make an appointment with a faculty member in the department from which you plan to receive your certificate. (For health law, see Prof. Blum. For child and family law, see Profs. Geraghty, Weinberg, Boyer or Platt. For tax law, see Profs. Kwall or Rhodes. For international law and practice, see Prof. Moses. For advocacy, see Prof. Carey.) **Bring your completed form and your transcript with you.** The faculty member will counsel you on your curricular choices for the certificate and the core subjects covered on the bar exam. At the appointment, have the faculty member sign your form.
4. Bring your signed form with you to your graduation interview with the law school Registrar, Dora Jacks. **YOU MUST APPLY FOR THE CERTIFICATE AT THE TIME OF YOUR GRADUATION INTERVIEW!** (This does not apply to the Advocacy certificate – those should be given to Professor Carey two months before graduation.) The Registrar will certify that you meet all of the certificate requirements after final grades have been calculated.

5. Your certificate status will be noted on your transcript when your degree is conferred and you will be informed as to when and where to pick up your certificate and diploma.

APPELLATE ADVOCACY HONORS PROGRAM

TRYOUTS for 2010 -2011 teams will be conducted in the Spring 2010 semester. Interested students should pick up a packet from Dean Gaspardo's office bulletin board panel outside Room 1471.

CURRENT TEAM MEMBERS, you *must* do the following:

1. REGISTER for 1 credit hour in the spring semester.
2. **ALL TEAM MEMBERS** in the Loyola Appellate Advocacy Honors Program, i.e., on a Loyola moot court team, **MUST** attend class on Wednesday nights from 5:00 - 7:00 p.m. in the spring semester, **DO NOT SCHEDULE ANY OTHER CLASS WHICH CONFLICTS WITH THIS TIME PERIOD!**

MISCELLANEOUS BUT IMPORTANT.....

IF YOU ARE INTERESTED IN SWITCHING DIVISIONS:

Students who want to transfer to a new division, effective Spring 2010 must have a division transfer form signed by Dean Gaspardo by **October 30, 2009**. **Students are permitted to transfer divisions only once during their law school careers. Students are not permitted to change divisions after registration has begun.**

AVOID LATE FEES AND WITHDRAWAL FOR NON-PAYMENT

After you register through LOCUS you will receive a statement of tuition and fees. Payment in full (less pending Financial Aid) must be received by the due date shown on the invoice or a late charge fee will be added to your account. **Loyola University Chicago reserves the right to withdraw students from classes after the tuition due date for non-payment of tuition.**

CANCELLED COURSES

Classes which do not meet the minimum enrollment requirement set by the School of Law are subject to cancellation.

CLOSED CLASSES

Please keep the following points in mind as you prepare for registration:

Each of you is scheduled to register with your classmates. By registering as early as possible during your scheduled time, you give yourself the best opportunity to get the courses you want. You lose that advantage by waiting to register.

If a class is full, the system will not permit further registrations unless a student drops the class. If you want to register in a class that is full, keep in mind the following:

1. If a class that you want is full, your **only** option is to continue to access the LOCUS system and add the course if an opening occurs. In order for an opening to occur, another student must drop the class. In past years, nearly every class that has been filled, has later opened up - even the most popular classes. Of course, there is no guarantee that you'll get in, but there is a great deal of "turnover" during registration and the advantage will go to the students who keep trying.
2. Instructors are not able to open up the system and permit you to register. While a faculty member may have sympathy for your situation, or even want you in the class, he or she does not have the ability to let you in. Besides, an "end run" that circumvents the electronic systems would not be fair to your classmates who were blocked out of the course and went on to another choice.

3. Members of the administration are always pleased to try to help, but when a class is full, there is little that can be done other than to encourage you to continue to try through the system. There is no way to open up a particular class for an individual and still be fair to the students who did not get in that class.
4. Sitting in on the class or dragging another chair in the room is not the same thing as registering for the class. You won't get credit for a class unless you have registered for it properly. Again, that wouldn't be fair to your classmates who were blocked out of the class and went on to another choice.

Please take some time to look over the attached materials, and prepare for registration carefully. Finally, register early within your assigned time. Electronic registration is a rigid system, but it is fair.

WITHDRAWING AND DROPPING CLASSES

IF YOU DECIDE NOT TO ATTEND SOME OR ALL OF YOUR COURSES AFTER REGISTERING, you must officially withdraw through the LOCUS system or the Law School Registrar Office, or you will be held responsible for all charges on your account. **You are considered to be in attendance until you drop the course.** If you withdraw from a class or classes, and that withdrawal affects your tuition, your tuition charges will be based on the date of official withdrawal not on the number of class meetings you attend. After **February 1st**, all withdrawals will result in a refund that is prorated according to a schedule set by the Office of the University Bursar. Students who drop a class or classes after the official withdrawal deadline of **February 5, 2010** will receive a failing grade of “WF” but will be responsible for fees and tuition according to this Hourly Adjustment Policy.

IF YOU CHANGE YOUR SCHEDULE

J.D. students are charged a flat-rate tuition. Full-time students must take from 12 to 17 hours for the same flat-rate tuition. Part-time students must take from 8 to 12 hours for the same flat-rate tuition. (However, part-time students who wish to exceed 12 hours in any semester must receive written permission from either Dean Faught or Dean Gaspardo).

All students who drop a class or classes after the official withdrawal deadline of **February 5, 2010** will receive a failing grade of “WF” but will be responsible for fees and tuition according to the Hourly Adjustment Policy.

Students who decide not to attend some or all of their classes after registering for them are obliged to officially withdraw through the registration system or the Law School Registrar’s Office in a timely manner or they will be held responsible for all of the charges on their accounts and the resulting grades.

IF YOU WITHDRAW COMPLETELY FROM THE SCHOOL OF LAW

Withdrawal is defined as completely withdrawing from all classes. Financial responsibility and refund policies for a complete withdrawal from the university or dropping of classes are NOT based on the number of classes attended. Charges are based on the withdrawal date as determined by the School of Law.

Complete withdrawal before the beginning of the term start date: A complete withdrawal from the School of Law before the official term start date can be done through LOCUS. No financial responsibility will be incurred except for any non-refundable fees.

Complete withdrawal after the term start date: Any student withdrawing on the same day from all classes will have their tuition and fees adjusted according to the schedule below. Charges will be based on the official withdrawal date from the School of Law. To completely withdraw, contact Dean Gaspardo directly.

Complete withdrawal after the official withdrawal deadline for the term (after February 5). Students will receive all “WF” grades and will be responsible for fees and tuition according to the Withdrawal Schedule below.

GRADUATIONS AND BAR EXAMS

IF YOU WANT TO GRADUATE...

YOU MUST SCHEDULE A GRADUATION INTERVIEW

The purpose of the Graduation Interview is to review credentials and to register for graduation. Appointments must be made with Dora Jacks, Registrar. Graduating students are responsible for completion of all requirements prior to graduation. **Students who do not complete a graduation interview will not graduate with their class.**

MAY 2010 PROSPECTIVE GRADUATES

JURIS DOCTOR students who have not already made an appointment for May 2010 graduation **must** schedule a telephone interview with the Registrar **no later than December 4, 2009**

AUGUST 2010 and JANUARY 2011 PROSPECTIVE GRADUATES

JURIS DOCTOR students who intend to graduate in August 2010 or January 2011 **must file for graduation between February 15-19, 2010.** Appointments may be made by telephone (312) 915-7167 or in person. Each appointment is approximately fifteen minutes, and will determine if the student will have the required 86 hours necessary for graduation.

THE ILLINOIS AND MULTI-STATE BAR EXAM

MULTISTATE PROFESSIONAL RESPONSIBILITY EXAM (MPRE)

The MPRE is the Multistate Professional Responsibility Examination, a multiple choice exam containing 50 questions, which is produced, marketed, and administered by the American College of Testing (ACT) on behalf of the National Conference of Bar Examiners (NCBE) three times each calendar year (March, August, and November). The test is designed to measure the examinee's knowledge of the ethical standards of the legal profession and is two hours and five minutes in length. Many jurisdictions, including Illinois, require bar applicants to write the MPRE. The MPRE is also scored and scaled nationally, although each jurisdiction establishes its own passing score. Visit the website of the NCBE at www.ncbex.org for detailed information.

At Loyola University Chicago School of Law, all students must have earned at least 57.0 credit hours before sitting for the MPRE.

ILLINOIS BAR APPLICATIONS

Students who did not complete the character and fitness application with the Illinois Bar in their first year must wait until their last year to apply. Applicants who wish to apply after their first year, but before their last year must submit in writing to the Illinois Board of Admissions to the Bar an explanation as to why they want to apply at that time. The Board will only approve law student applications at that time if an applicant has serious matters of concern that will take time to investigate.

Third and Fourth Year Students

Students who plan to take the Illinois bar exam in July 2010 can complete application materials on-line through the website of the Illinois Board of Admissions to the Bar (www.ibaby.org). The final application deadline is **February 1, 2010**. Students who did not complete the character and fitness application in their first year must complete it by this deadline when they apply to sit for the bar exam.

LOCKERS

CLEAN-OUT DATE: In order to allow time to prepare lockers for redistribution in the Fall semester, lockers must be cleaned out by **June 1, 2010**. Thereafter, contents will be discarded.

LEGEND

The Notes column of the registration packet is designed to provide guidance to students regarding the particular course offering. The notations have the following meanings:

“BAR” -- Although all law school courses prepare students to sit for the Bar Exam, these courses cover substantive areas of the law that are consistently tested on the Bar Exam or Model Professional Responsibility Exam in Illinois and in virtually every state.

“CERT REQ.” -- These courses are required for the receipt of a certificate in Advocacy (“A”), Child & Family Law (“CF”), Health Law (“HL”), International Law and Practice (“IL”) or Tax Law (“TL”).

“CERT ELEC.” -- These courses are among the electives that may be taken by students to satisfy the elective requirements for a certificate in each specified area of law.

“SKILLS” -- While students are exposed to professional lawyering skills in courses throughout the curriculum, these particular classes offer substantial instruction in professional skills generally regarded as necessary for effective and responsible participation in the legal profession, including trial and appellate advocacy, alternative methods of dispute resolution, counseling, interviewing, negotiating, problem solving, factual investigation, organization and management of legal work and drafting. These classes also engage students in skills performances that are assessed by the professor. **All J.D. students must complete two credits in one or more designated “skills” classes in order to graduate.**

“JD. Req.” -- These courses are required for receipt of the J.D. degree; and where indicated must be taken in a particular semester.

“MJ Only” – These courses are available only to M.J. Students.

“LL.M. Only” – These courses are available only to LL.M. students.

“PER ELEC” – These elective classes examine perspectives on the Law and Justice. **All full-time 1L students** must register for one of these electives in the **spring** of their first year. **All other students must complete one of these electives after their first-year and before graduation.**

Health Law Graduate Externships - (Not available to J.D. students.)

The externship is designed for graduate students who wish to gain field experience in health law. Students are placed in a professional association or health care institution and complete a project or projects under the direction of an externship mentor. Externs are required to work 55 hours per semester for each credit hour earned. Students who wish to register for externships must first contact the Assistant Director of Beazley Institute to determine site placement. They then must complete and submit to him/her the Graduate Legal Studies Course Approval Form contained in this packet. The LOCUS registration system will not accept an externship registration without prior approval. **Note: This course should not be confused with the J.D. externship program which is open only to J.D. students.**

Health Law Directed Studies - (Not available to J.D. Students.)

Students may earn up to three hours of credit by working on a targeted health law research project. The scope and subject are chosen with the guidance of a faculty member who directs the students.
