Use the criteria in the left column of this rubric to evaluate each of the five elements commonly found in abstracts listed across the top. On the bottom, write down your comments on the abstract overall. Be sure to check the "call for abstracts" before evaluating, to determine the appropriate audience, length, and focus of the abstract. Use this rubric to guide you as you write and revise your abstract. Always try to have your mentor comment on your abstract, and never misrepresent your work.

Compelling: How interesting, important, and convincing is each element? Overall, would you like to see a poster or hear a talk about the research?
