**T**he interdisciplinary minor in Asian studies provides an avenue for students to investigate the heritage and contemporary developments of Asia from many disciplines, including anthropology, fine arts, history, modern languages, philosophy, political science, sociology, and theology.

Asia is defined broadly in this program as the nations of Northeast, East, Southeast, and South Asia (e.g., Japan, Korea, China, Thailand, Brunei, Timor Leste, Indonesia, Philippines, Laos, Singapore, Vietnam, Cambodia, Myanmar/Burma, India, and Pakistan).

The minor also includes courses that focus on Asian Diasporas, including Asian American communities in the United States. Faculty members from many departments teach established Asian studies courses, and they also offer courses on special topics.



Located in the capital of modern China, the Beijing Center is a study abroad program established in 1998 to provide Jesuit university students with premier comprehensive education about China.

## THE MINOR

### *Why Asian studies?*

Whether you want to gain advantage in the international world of business, explore your own Asian heritage, study Asian medical systems, or simply learn more about this fascinating part of the world, choosing to minor in Asian studies will enhance your marketability. The Asian studies minor effectively complements a variety of majors, including anthropology, history, fine arts, political science, sociology, literature, theology, marketing, and finance. Students who plan to continue their studies with an advanced degree in Asian studies or a related field can lay their educational groundwork at Loyola University Chicago.

Our society is becoming increasingly more global and ethnically diverse. Asians in the American labor force are expected to triple to 10 million within the next 30 years. Asian businesses have become transnational leaders in the fields of international trade, finance, and technology.

### Requirements

The Asian studies minor consists of six courses (18 credit hours) completed with a grade of "C" or better, including one required course.

Two of the courses taken for the minor must be at the 300 level, and no more than three courses from any one department may count

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toward the minor. Coursework in Asian languages is not required, but courses in Asian languages may count toward the required coursework in Asian studies.

Minors must complete an "Intent to Declare" form and submit the form to the Asian studies program director and then to their dean. For more information, please contact the Asian studies director.

## Course Offerings

**ASIA 101—Explorations in Asian Studies:** This required variable topics course introduces students both to Asia as a geographical region and to the field of Asian studies. Different sections of this course will focus on various themes to reflect the interests and expertise of the instructor. Possible topics include, but are not limited to Asian Civilizations, Modern Asia, History of Asia, Religions of Asia, or Asian Diasporas. The course will remain thematically focused but geographically broad in order to expose students to Asia's diverse countries and cultures. To this end, the course will normally cover materials from East Asia, South Asia, and Southeast Asia.
