Note on August 2020 FOTL

As we look ahead at our future FOTL planning process, we will use feedback from this summer's conference to determine if offering FOTL in a combination of virtual and in person formats makes sense moving forward.

Ignatian Pedagogy Certificate Program

Description

The Ignatian Pedagogy Certificate program is a year-long series of workshops for Loyola University Chicago faculty, staff, and graduate students, designed to touch on each aspect of the Ignatian pedagogical paradigm. Over the course of the certificate program, participants learned how to enhance and deepen their own pedagogy while becoming versed in the rich, 500 year-old tradition of Ignatian pedagogy. Participants were required to attend "Introduction to Ignatian Pedagogy" as well as any three other sessions. Other requirements included three written reflections and a final project.

Summary

Academic Year (AY) 2019-2020, (compared to AY 2018-2019), saw increased attendance at individual seminars and saw the completion rate of the program double. We had thirty participants enroll in the program, compared to nineteen participants in 2018-2019. The completion rate increased by 200% from last year to this year.

Due to COVID-19 one of our sessions was canceled and our final session, which was to feature José Mesa, S.J., was shifted to a reflection session, without presenter.

Description

Online Teaching Course

Administered by Loyola's Office of Online Learning, the Online Teaching Course (OTC) is designed to prepare faculty for teaching and delivering high-quality online, hybrid, and blended courses. FCIP assists the Office of Online Learning by helping them facilitate the course, OTC: Design. FCIP lends their expertise in course design and pedagogy in order to help the Office of Online Learning meet the high demand for this course. Staff, graduate students, and faculty complete the four week online course. Between Aug 2019 and July 2020, eight (8) sections of the course were delivered. Roughly 150 faculty completed the OTC this year.

Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Discussion Circles

These monthly gatherings are a chance for faculty to share successes or challenges they experience with teaching diversity, equity, and inclusion issues. This group provides peer mentoring, support and practical solutions for classroom situations. FCIP co-sponsors these circles with the Acting Assistant Provost for Academic Diversity, the Center for Experiential Learning (CEL), and Student Academic Services.

Ignatian Pedagogy AJCU Survey and Roundtable

FCIP seeks to collaborate with our American Jesuit Colleges and Universities (AJCU) sister institutions in our understanding and application of Ignatian Pedagogy. A survey was administered by FCIP to colleagues at the other 26 AJCU institutions to determine how Ignatian Pedagogy and related Jesuit educational programming is integrated into their organizational structure. Sixty-seven percent (67%) of institutions responded. Complete survey results are available upon request.

In February 2020, FCIP staff members attended an Ignatian Pedagogy Roundtable at John Carroll University in Cleveland, OH to discuss an initiative to help facilitate more concentrated academic study of Ignatian Pedagogy, In the future, FCIP hopes to spearhead initiatives with other AJCU partners to continue to promote the academic study of IP This conversation will continue with larger gatherings and conference-style presentations on Ignatian Pedagogy in 2021-22.

Library Resource Guide

Creating the Scholarship of Teaching and Learning: Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Pedagogy Library Guides was a collaboration with the Center for Experiential Learning. These guides are intended to promote scholarship generated by Loyola University Chicago faculty related to teaching and learning and to showcase seminal pieces of scholarship recommended by both Centers and available through the library.
