Biographical History

Ruth Ann Hoffelder, later known as Sr. Margaret Hoffelder, SSJ was born August 15, 1931 in Waterloo, Indiana. In the mid-1940s Sr. Margaret attended Ashley High School in Auburn, Indiana. Upon graduation she was accepted to St. Francis College where she later completed a Masters degree in Theology. While at St. Francis College, Sr. Margaret joined the Sisters of St. Joseph, Third Order of St. Francis. It was also during her stay at St. Francis that she began teaching elementary school. In the late 1950s, while teaching Music and Religion at St. Francis High School, Sr. Margaret attended DePaul University in Chicago, Illinois. In 1963 she earned a Bachelor's degree in Music Education as well as a Masters of Music in Liturgical Music.

Shortly thereafter, she accepted a position as the Formation Director of St. Francis Convent where she stayed until 1970 when she began her position as a professor of theology at St. Francis College. In 1975 Sr. Margaret accepted the position of Associate Pastor at St. Andrews Church and later at Our Lady of Good Hope, where she remained for over a decade. During her tenure at Our Lady of Good Hope, Sr. Margaret and six other women founded a feminine spiritual center named Sophia's Portico, in Fort Wayne, Indiana. Sr. Margaret was elected Executive Director and held the position until her death in 2010.

During her time as Executive Director she conducted extensive Scripture and goddess research. Sr. Margaret presented several lecture series on matriarchs of the Bible as well as ancient goddesses and their position in Christian theology. Her goddess centered research allowed her to lead two tour groups throughout Europe searching for the Divine Feminine and goddess holy sites.

Scope and Content

The Margaret Hoffelder, SSJ Papers contain material related to Sr. Margaret's professional career as a teacher and lecturer in Fort Wayne, IN. Though some biographical information exists within the collection, the bulk of documents are presentation notes and research for her various lecture series

and international tours. The collection is divided into three series and materials are arranged alphabetically within each series.

Series 1: Biographical, 1960-2009, Box 1

This series consists of glimpses into Sr. Margaret's personal education and an overview of her professional life. Materials include a resume, brief biography, a panorama of the history of the Christian church, University of St. Francis magazine, and a graded paper authored by Sr. Margaret.

Series 2: Lecture Notes/Research, 1981-2010, n.d., Box 1

Materials in this collection document Sr. Margaret's lectures including the lecture series entitled *Uncovering Buried Treasures*, these notes comprise the majority of this series and track the involvement of women in the Bible since the Dawn of Civilization. Also included in this series are magazine and newspapers articles used in Sr. Margaret's research.

Series 3: Goddess Research/Documents, 1999-2008, Box 2

Several items from Sr. Margaret's goddess research comprise this collection including: presentation notes, research, pictures, and travel logs, which Sr. Margaret created to assist in her search for the Divine Feminine and goddess sites.
